I had my first Spanish-speaking-ONLY family last Friday-Saturday [October 2016], on the progressive care unit (a step-down from ICU). While there was a MARTTI audio-video machine that could call an interpreter with a few easy button presses, it wasn't always convenient to use this for quick questions.

But, I walked in and gave it my best shot, and I was actually able to perform almost all my care that weekend without the interpreter, and still making sure that my patient's pain was managed, the family's needs were met, they understood procedures and medications, etc. To me, that was probably the biggest accomplishment of my career, since you so often see hospital staff walk into a room, talk AT a patient, ask if they understand (to which the confused family nods and says, yes, in an attempt not to offend) and then leave, never confirming that the family had any clue what just happened. One of my biggest pet peeves is healthcare workers not making sure that patients of different languages and cultures have their needs met just as well as everyone else, especially when there are resources available!

It was just so wonderful to be able to talk with my Spanish-speaking patients. Even though I stumbled over grammar, I could get my point across, even in a medical context. I know that there is NO WAY that would have happened without my experience being immersed in the language both in Uruguay with PLU and later in Guatemala on my own. I loved learning about the culture and history of Uruguay, and staying with a host mom right on the Rio de la Plata, just a block away from the shining gold sand and soccer fields. I adored walking to school each day past the flower stands and bakeries, having the locals say hello every morning even though we had no idea how to make small talk back, and seeing baby hawks and other exotic animals at the market. Those are experiences that I never would want to miss out on!

So yes, I highly recommend that PLU continue the J-Term trip to Uruguay, and that every student who can squeeze onto the plane sign their name up and get the wonderful experiences that I had.
